## **5 U.S.C. §7342 FOREIGN GIFTS AND DECORATIONS ACT**

Federal employee receives foreign gift on behalf of U.S. within 60 days, employee submits gift to employing agency employee reports donor, date, value, brief description, and disposition, if known employing agency reviews and submits employee gift lists to Department of State, Chief of Protocol

Department of State reviews and publishes to Federal Register no deadline at will

GIFT: Tangible/intangible present tendered by/received from a foreign government or foreign organization.

VALUE: Minimum gift value of \$480 or more in the U.S. at the time of acceptance. Federal entities may self-define

minimal value (e.g., U.S. Senate is \$100+).

EMPLOYEE: The President, Vice President, Congress, U.S. Military, Judicial Branch, Candidates, Federal Employees,

Contractors, Spouses, Minor Dependents, and Students 23 years old and under.

FOREIGN GOV'T: Any unit of foreign governmental authority, any international or multinational organization (e.g., NATO)

whose membership is composed of any unit of foreign government or an agent/representative acting as such.

ACCEPTANCE: Congress allows acceptance of foreign travel, educational scholarships, decorations, medical treatments, and

gifts above \$480 only if refusal would be an "embarrassment to the donor and the U.S. Government."

**REPORTING:** On January 31st, the Department of State's politically appointed Chief of Protocol receives lists of foreign gifts

from all federal employees. The report is due 11 days AFTER the end of a Presidential term when 4,000 politically appointed federal employees leave office, including the Protocol Chief. Without a deadline to publish in the Federal Register, the report is released at will and includes footnotes not seen by the giftee.

**PENALTY:** The employing agency is responsible for reporting to the Attorney General (AG) an employee who knowingly

solicits a gift from a foreign government or fails to deposit or report a foreign gift for possible civil action in

any U.S. District Court.

## **THE GARD ACT**

Federal employee receives foreign gift on behalf of U.S. within 60 days, employee submits gift to employing agency employee reports donor, date, value, description, and specific disposition or OGE Form 278e/450 Part 9 employing agency reviews and submits 278e/450 Part 9 to OGE and sends a copy to the Secretary of State

Department of State reviews and publishes to Federal Register 30 days after May 15

ELIMINATES mismanagement and inconsistent foreign gift reporting proven to be unreliable, inaccurate, and burdensome.

TRANSFERS the collection of foreign gift disclosures from the Department of State to the Office of Government Ethics.

UTILIZES the Office of Government Ethics' existing gift reporting process using Form OGE 278e/450 Part 9.

**REQUIRES** disclosure of foreign gifts given to adult children and relatives over \$480.

**PROTECTS** the identity of minor children, students, and disabled dependents by redacting personal information.

AVOIDS embarrassing foreign donors and the U.S. Gov't while ensuring transparent and accurate gift dispositions.

INSTRUCTS Department of State to publish Foreign Gift List in the Federal Register within 30 days of receipt.

**EXPANDS** designation of foreign entities to include foreign individuals, businesses, not-for-profit organizations, etc.

**PROHIBITS** federal employees from accepting gifts from countries of concern as designated by the Secretary of State.

**PENALTY** of \$200 for reports filed more than 30 days after the due date, with an option to waive this fee if appropriate.
